**NATIONAL: Parent help program reduces child abuse -Author: Maggie Fox**

WASHINGTON (Reuters Life!) - A parenting program that trains nurses, social workers and even clergy to advise struggling parents lowered rates of child abuse and helped keep kids out of foster care, researchers reported. The Positive Parenting Program or "triple P" provides information on discipline from handling a grocery store tantrum to controlling bedwetting, the researchers said. It combines this training in a way that spreads the skills throughout a community, so parents do not have to seek the help, and do not have to be embarrassed by getting the advice, said Ron Prinz of the University of South Carolina, who led the study. "This is the first large-scale study to show that by providing all families, not just families in crisis, with access to parenting information and support, we can reduce the rates of child maltreatment in whole communities," Prinz said.

For the experiment, paid for by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Prinz and his team made the program available to all parents in 18 South Carolina counties. They found that over two years, proven cases of child abuse were reduced by 9 percent, foster care placements by 22 percent and hospitalizations or emergency-room visits by 14 percent. In a community with 100,000 children under age 8, Prinz reported in the journal *Prevention Science*, the program would lead to 688 fewer maltreated children, 240 fewer out-of-home placements such as to foster care, and 60 fewer serious injuries.

"Triple P has very practical parenting strategies that they can use to solve everyday kinds of problems -- things like how to deal with tantrums in the grocery store or mealtime issues or bedtime," Prinz said in a telephone interview. **STAYING CALM**

For instance, parents can be counseled on how to take the fun out of a grocery-store tantrum by refusing to give in to the child, but also without hitting or yelling at the child. "The parent needs to stay calm and not play into the tantrum by raising their level of anger or lecturing or cajoling. When a child is throwing a tantrum you don't want to reason with them or argue with them," Prinz said. "You have to look at each shopping trip as an opportunity to strengthen non-tantrum behavior." Often the best reward is the promise of some attention if the child behaves as desired, Prinz said. "That is usually what they want in the first place, anyway," he said. Many studies have shown that the approaches work, Prinz said. And busy parents will save time in the end.

Prevent Child Abuse America estimates that child abuse and neglect costs more than \$94 billion a year in 2001 dollars in the United States alone, and found 3.3 million referrals of alleged child abuse or neglect and 899,000 substantiated child abuse or neglect cases in 2005. "Children who have been abused are much more likely to have mental health problems later," Prinz said. "They are much more likely to get into trouble as teenagers and adults ... they are unhappy in their lives and less productive in work."

**MRI, MRS and fMRI Among Children with FASD**

A comprehensive neuropsychological battery, coupled with magnetic resonance imaging, (MRI), MR spectroscopy (MRS), and functional MRI (fMRI) were administered to children with fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASD) to determine if neurostructural, neurochemical, or neurofunctional abnormalities could be identified across the spectrum, and distinguish diagnostic subclassifications within the spectrum.

**Group Interventions for children and teens with FASD: Promoting successful social engagement, skill-building, and fun!"**

This session will provide an overview of social interaction challenges associated with FASD in childhood and adolescence. Two group intervention models targeting social skill development and friendship building for school-aged children and adolescents will be described.

Practical strategies to support successful group interventions will also be presented.

**Advances in Intervention for Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders**

This presentation will provide an overview of advances in FASD intervention, an area receiving growing attention over the past few years. Recently published research studies show positive outcomes for families and children with FASD. Behavioral consultation and key worker programs, computer training, mentoring programs, parent support, direct skill-building for children and teens, and early intervention are all areas of study with emerging data and new ideas. Local research on the Families Moving Forward Program, a specialized caregiver support and consultation intervention with promising results (now being disseminated to other states), will be highlighted.

**Sensory Processing: Practical Strategies for Home and School**

Together we will define common vocabulary around sensory processing and provide a working definition for "Sensory Integration". Clarify the role of occupational therapy in assessment and Sensory Integration interventions in school based and private therapy. And provide examples of strategies and opportunities for discussion and case based problem solving around common home and school based problems.

## Washington will receive \$23 million stimulus grants for youth, young adult worker training!

Gov. Chris Gregoire and Employment Security Commissioner Karen Lee announced this week that \$23 million in federal stimulus grants are being distributed throughout Washington to pay for summer employment and training programs for at-risk youths and young adults.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act authorized additional funding for local employment and training programs sponsored through the federal Workforce Investment Act. Summer youth programs must provide participants with work experience. They may include classroom training and other services to help participants improve their work qualifications.

To be eligible for the summer youth program, participants must be between the ages of 16 to 24 and low-income. Services are focused on youths who are most in need, including those who have dropped out of school or are at risk of dropping out, youths who are in foster care, homeless, runaway, disabled, or those whose parents are incarcerated. Military veterans and their spouses who meet the age and income criteria also may participate and will receive priority service.

The Employment Security Department will apportion the money among the state's 12 workforce development councils based on a federal formula linked to local poverty and unemployment rates. The services themselves are obtained or arranged through local WorkSource offices. Locations are printed the blue pages of telephone books or online at [Go2WorkSource.com](http://Go2WorkSource.com)

The amount of each local grant is as follows for these workforce development areas:

-- Olympic (Clallam, Jefferson, Kitsap counties), \$890,834

-- Pacific Mountain (Grays Harbor, Lewis, Mason, Pacific, Thurston counties), \$1.7 million

-- Tacoma-Pierce, \$2.5 million

Washington state is administering the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act investments with a level of transparency and accountability. Gov. Gregoire created a Web site -- <http://www.recovery.wa.gov>

## **Developing Brains: Alcohol Worse than Marijuana**

(PhysOrg.com) -- It appears that when it comes to teen brain development, parents should be more worried about alcohol abuse than marijuana abuse. Two recent studies have been published showing that alcohol -- a legal substance (though not legal for teens in the U.S.) -- is considered more dangerous than marijuana, which is illegal in many countries.

One study has been published in the U.S., in the journal *Clinical EEG and neuroscience: official journal of the EEG and Clinical Neuroscience Society (ENCS)*, and shows that alcohol has a stronger effect on teen brain development than marijuana. The other is a study published in the *Lancet*, offering the results of substance classification by a number of U.K. professionals, purporting that alcohol is more dangerous than marijuana to individuals and to society.

The U.S. study was undertaken by Squeglia, Jacobus and Tapert in a San Diego State University/ University of California San Diego joint doctoral program. The study looks at teen brain development for its uniqueness, as well as for the effects that substance abuse has on the brain during this time. Because alcohol and marijuana are commonly used by high school students, it is little surprise that the study is interested in the brain abnormalities stemming from abuse of these substances.

When the brain abnormalities were measured -- seen in terms of brain functioning and structure, cognitive tasks and quality of white matter -- it appeared as though alcohol had a great effect than marijuana. Heavy drinking was defined 20 drinks per month, and the abnormalities were detectable. In heavy marijuana users, abnormalities existed, but not to the same degree as those seen in alcohol abusers.

Findings from the U.S. study, showing that alcohol use in teens causes more irregular brain function than marijuana, would seem to square with efforts in the U.K. to encourage new drug classification. In the *Lancet*, David Nutt at Bristol University, along with his colleagues, asked psychologists and scientifically or medically trained police to rank different substances according to how harmful they are. The study purports that experts rank alcohol (and tobacco) as more harmful than marijuana. In a list of 20 substances, alcohol came in at number five, tobacco came in at number nine, and marijuana/cannabis came in at number eleven.

These studies are likely to add fuel to movements in both the U.S. and the U.K. to re-classify marijuana. Supporters of fewer restrictions on marijuana will undoubtedly point to scientific studies that show we already legalize less dangerous substances.
